REFLECTIONS

"IN A SPIRIT OF ONENESS" Rev Susie Webster-Tolono Congregational Church of Westminster West, UCC

Greetings, beloved church and community!

I'm so excited that this Whistler can be one that touts an *in person* Community Fair, after two years of our trying to replicate something of the joy through on-line connection. Similarly, I've been truly moved to see children in my (Brattleboro) neighborhood waiting for the bus as they resume school. You know, *in* school, not via the internet. I've been thinking about traditions that can now resume, as well as about those things that are probably changed forever.

Actually, these thoughts aren't new in this post-isolation era. Throughout the years of my ministry here in West West (an unbelievable twenty years so far as of this October!), I've noticed changes in the role Church plays in our world (with Church meaning pretty much any religious institution, in this instance). One of the obvious and sad aspects is a decline of congregations, with many nearby churches closing their doors so that their members can seek their own life-giving callings in the world in other ways. On the other hand, in places where churches remain vital, the people who are involved are usually *more* deeply engaged than they used to be; no longer do people go to church simply to keep up appearances, but rather they engage deeply in the faith-life of a congregation because something in their heart draws them to worship. The odd truth is that we seem to be living in an age that is both less religious than it used to be, and also far more spiritually alive and engaged. I see this in the funerals I officiate as well as the weddings, and I hear it from the people who seek me out for spiritual guidance. Though I am emphatically a Christian (a fact that some who fall far to the right of me on the theological/political spectrum might doubt, but I stick to my truth on this one), I find such beauty in the ways I see Godlovers of all stripes connecting with Spirit, walking in love, and living out of their truest selves in ways that don't look at all like church-based Christianity but which I believe make God very happy indeed.

To me, this is exciting! I honor those among us with a traditional and learned faith, but I am thrilled to find that people are finding their way to a deep connection with Spirit in ways some of us may never have dreamed of. I recently officiated at a double baptism for a family I've known in various aspects over the years. The ritual was to be performed in the grandparents' back yard stream, and relatives involved were from varied backgrounds: from deep Guilford roots to island culture, from Greek Orthodoxy (loosely) to Conservative Baptist (not loosely at all), from very religious to not at all religious in any classic sense, and many places in between. So ... what's a minister to do? Insist on the tried-and-true language of the vows about religious participation, knowing that in fact these children are unlikely to be raised in the bosom of a church community, or change the language so that the vows affirmed might be said with sincerity? I opted for the latter, keeping the Trinitarian (Father, Son, Holy Spirit) language of the rite itself, but changing the parental vows. Here's what I asked the four parents of the wee cousins:

*On this day of baptism, do you understand your daughter [name] to be precious in God's sight, and do you vow to raise her to know that to be true?

*Do you promise to teach [name] to follow the ways of love, compassion, and justice, resisting oppression and evil, as we recognize in the model of Jesus of Nazareth, who fed the hungry, visited the lonesome, healed the sick, spoke truth to power, and offered love wholeheartedly to all of creation?

We are living in an age where we have choices: to cling to the way things "always" have been whether they are life-giving or not, or to open ourselves to new ways while remaining anchored in the vital truth of our one-ness in God's good creation. As the composer Gustav Mahler wrote (or perhaps quoted a paraphrase of Thomas More), "Tradition is not the worship of ashes, but the preservation of fire." As we move into this changing world, may we in the church be open to hearing how God is leading us in courageous new ways, and may we continue to grow in love and power, serving the full humanity of all of our neighbors in a spirit of Oneness.

FALL EQUINOX LABYRINTH WALK THURSDAY, SEPT 22ND

The church is fortunate to own a gorgeous labyrinth, based on the ancient design in the cathedral of Chartres, France. It is a beautiful pattern, painted purple on canvas, and it rolls out to fill our sanctuary. Traditionally, we have opened the labyrinth each solstice and equinox, to observe the cycles of the natural world, as well as on Ash Wednesday, to open the season of Lent. This month, we will restart our labyrinth walks for the first time since the start of the pandemic.

All are welcome. Beyond the peaceful presence of the labyrinth, there is no particular program. It's very easy to walk the labyrinth: simply come with clean socks and your mask (spares are available at the church), and follow the path at your own pace. We encourage you to try this contemplative practice for yourself. The next scheduled walk will celebrate the fall equinox: Thursday, Sept 22nd. You are welcome to stop by between 7 and 8 pm. ABOLISH SLAVERY

A Prop 2 presentation

Vermont Interfaith Action's (VIA) Executive Director, Rev. Debbie Ingram, will conduct a presentation entitled "Abolish Slavery: Educating Our Communities on Prop 2" on Tuesday, Sept 6th from 7 pm to 8:15 pm on Zoom. The purpose of this presentation is to explain the Vermont constitution's current language regarding slavery and how it evolved; how this language has influenced the U.S. Constitution and many of our systems and practices; and the proposed amendment, which Vermont voters will have the chance to pass on November 8, 2022. Participants will also learn of opportunities to take action to ensure passage of the amendment, and to address the larger question of how to dismantle systemic racism in many forms. 

RACES: 5K ROAD RACE: There are *4* classes for men and women in the 5K road Race: Youth (13-17), Open (18-39), Masters (40-59) and Seniors (60 and older). THE KIDS FUN RUN is for ages 12 and under, with age-based classes for boys and girls. Entry fees: 5K race - *\$15 adults, \$10 for youth,* and \$3 for the Fun Run.

REGISTRATION for the 5*K* begins at 8:30am.and the Race starts at 9am with a mass start. The course is over relatively flat, <u>shady</u> dirt roads, passing through scenic countryside and apple orchards. Registration for the Kids Fun Run starts *right after the parade (at about 10:30am)* in front of the church, as the race starts at 11am. There will be 2 mass starts, one for older and one for younger runners.

PARADE: Westminster West's annual parade will begin at 10:30 at the school and proceeds in its legendary and lovably haphazard manner toward the church. Bike decoration and drumming practice will start at 10am. The parade's Grand Marshal is Tony Coven, the best volunteer any little community could ask for who is ALWAYS THERE WHEN NEEDED.

Perennial favorites include Ladies Against Women and Westminster West's very own Pick-up Drumming Wagon pulled by David Major and his tractor (bring a drum or noise maker if you want to ride with them). All elected officials and candidates for office, stilt walkers, acrobats, clowns, new neighbors, and kids on decorated bikes, are invited to join the parade, everyone is welcome!!! VEGETABLE CONTEST: There are 3 categories for adults and kids, longest zucchini, vegetable sculpture, and artistic flower arrangements. Deadline for entries is noon day of Fair. Winners will be announced during Talent Show. Entries are on display in church foyer.

September is here – which means it is time to sign up for Vermont's Seasonal Heating Fuel Assistance Program, which can offset winter heating costs by anywhere from a few hundred to even a few thousand dollars. Senior Solutions can help you apply for assistance through Vermont's LIHEAP program, which could help lower your bills if you heat with oil, kerosene, propane, electric, coal, wood pellets, or wood.

Half of Vermont seniors who are eligible never even apply with the simple, 1-page application, leaving money on the table. Many others wait until the middle of winter, when the temperature, fuel level in the tank, and bank accounts are all running low. But by waiting until after November, even those found eligible receive only a portion of what they would otherwise be awarded.

This program is income and household-size based. If your income is at or below these levels, you qualify:

Household of 1 - 2,096/month Household of 2 - 2,823/month Household of 3 - 3,550/month Household of 4 - 4,279/month

Benefits are sent directly to your fuel company on your behalf, giving you a credit for the season. In the case of wood, it will either appear on an EBT card containing a cash amount, or could be directly deposited into your bank account.

There are many misconceptions about this program: It doesn't matter if you own your home, or rent, as long as you are incurring a heating cost. It doesn't have an "asset test," so the value of your vehicles, property, and bank accounts are immaterial.

ARCHAEOLOGIST GAIL GOLEC TO SPEAK AT

Westminster Historical Society Annual Meeting

This event will be held October 19th at 7pm at the Westminster Fire Station. After a short business meeting, archaeologist Gail Golec will give a talk titled "Interpreting Historical Landscapes" which will give us a view of a far deeper time-frame than we are used to thinking about. Lying between Kchi Pontegok (the Great Falls) and Wantastigok (Brattleboro,) Westminster occupies land that was inhabited for over ten thousand years before Europeans ever saw it. Golec is an expert on reaing this landscape and understanding history as the entirety of interactions between people and their environment. She's currently working on projects in both Bellows Falls and Brattleboro, and will help us understand the history hidden within this part of the Connecticut Valley, now called Vermont and New Hampshire, but known to the Abenaki people as N'dakinna; Our Land.

Gail was born and raised in the Upper Connecticut River Valley and has been a professional archaeologist in the area for over 20 years, working on sites primarily in New Hampshire and Vermont. Over the years, she has undertaken a number of research projects focusing on local history and with that research, Gail gives public presentations, teaches history classes and also hosts, writes and produces a history podcast about cemeteries called "The Secret Life of Death Podcast". Most recently, she was named co-manager of the "Kchi Pontegok Project", a National Park Service grant awarded to the Town of Rockingham in partnership with the Atowi Project. NEW TEEN PROGRAM To build community clay oven in Brattleboro Bonei Aish Chadash 'Builders of a New Fire' From Teresa Savel

A **bagel** is a yeasted bread dough, originating in the Jewish communities of Poland, that is first boiled for a short time in water and then baked. **Challah**, literally loaf in the Hebrew language is a special bread of Ashkenazi Jewish origin, usually braided and typically eaten on ceremonial occasions such as **Shabbat**, the day of rest & major Jewish holidays. **Pizza**, we all know what that is and how much teens love to eat it!

Gathering together, appreciating new friendships, and eating these foods, baked in a wood-fired clay oven, built alongside a team of peers are aspects of the new Teen Program: **Bonei Aish Chadash**, (translated as) '**Builders of a New Fire**', being offered through the Brattleboro Area Jewish Community (BAJC).
